



Start a Guardianship Case

What is this for?	<p>This packet contains the forms you will need to open a guardianship case. A guardianship case is for a non-parent who wants the right to care for and make important decisions for a minor child. There are other non-court options that may work for your situation. Visit the Self-Help Center for help.</p> <p>This packet also contains the additional forms you need to open the case faster than usual. This is referred to as a “temporary guardianship” and if granted, will last until an order for the full guardianship is made.</p>
Step 1: Fill out the forms	<p>Notice of Hearing (GC-020) Petition for Guardianship (GC-210) Child Information Attachment (GC-210(CA)) [one form needed per child] Declaration Under UCCJEA (GC-120) Confidential Guardianship Screening Form (GC-212) [one form needed per guardian] Duties of Guardian (GC-248)</p> <p>Optional: Consent of Guardian, Nomination, and Waiver of Notice (GC-211)</p> <p>*If your situation is urgent and cannot wait several weeks for a hearing, you must fill out the forms below <i>in addition to</i> the forms above to ask for a <i>temporary</i> guardianship to be ordered to last until the hearing:</p> <p>Petition for Temporary Guardianship (GC-110) Order Appointing Temporary Guardianship of Minor (GC-140) Letters of Temporary Guardianship (GC-150)</p>
Step 2: Make copies	<p>Take each form (except the Order Appointing Guardian (GC-240) and Letters of Guardianship (GC-250)) and make 2 copies. Paperclip (do not staple) the <u>original</u>. The copies may be stapled. Put the copies right behind each original.</p> <p>Note: If you file electronically, copies are not required (see Step 3).</p>
Step 3: File the forms	<p>Get a number ticket for “Civil” at the kiosk on the 1st floor of the Roseville courthouse. Note: If you are filing at the Historic Courthouse in Auburn or the Tahoe Courthouse, you do not need to get a ticket. File the paperwork with the clerk when your number is called. The court will file-stamp all your forms and give you back the 2 copies. You will keep a filed copy for your records and use the other copy to make more copies for the relatives who need to be given (“served”) copies of the forms.</p>



<p>eFiling</p> <p>Filing fee</p>	<p>Alternatively, the Court has the option to file electronically through its eFile Service. For filing and more information, please visit placer.courts.ca.gov and select “eFiling” under the Online Services tab. This webpage contains instructions and FAQs to assist with the process. There is a service fee for eFiling paid to the third-party vendor and cannot be waived by the Court. Note: each form must be a separate PDF unless it contains attachments.</p> <p>There is a \$225 fee to open a guardianship of the person only. If you are opening a guardianship of the person <i>and</i> estate or guardianship of the estate only, there is a \$435 filing fee. The Court accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard, AMEX and Discover Card. If the child(ren) of the guardianship has no or low income, fill out the fee waiver forms to ask to not pay the court filing fee. The fee waiver is granted, or not, based on the child(ren)’s income and assets. You may apply for a fee waiver by filling out and filing these forms:</p> <p>Request to Waive Court Fees (FW-001-GC) Order on Court Fee Waiver (FW-003-GC)</p>
<p>Step 3.5: For Temporary Guardianships Only</p>	<p>The judicial officer will review your forms and either make immediate orders, order a quicker than typical hearing date, or schedule you for a regular hearing date. The date will be written on the Notice of Hearing (GC-020).</p> <p>The Clerk will tell you how to contact them to find out when your forms are ready to pick up.</p>
<p>Step 4: Serve the forms</p>	<p>The parents and the child(ren) subject to the guardianship if 12 years or older must be handed (“personally served”) a copy of the filed forms below. The grandparents on both sides, any siblings age 12 or older, and the Regional Center may be mailed (“served by mail”) a copy of these filed forms:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ Notice of Hearing (GC-020)▪ Petition for Guardianship (GC-210)▪ Child Information Attachment (GC-210(CA)) [one form needed per child]▪ Declaration Under UCCJEA (GC-120)▪ Consent of Guardian, Nomination, and Waiver of Notice (GC-211) <p>Copies from eFiling may be printed from your eFiling account. Someone 18 or older must serve the forms for you. You cannot serve the forms yourself.</p> <p>Exception: If any of the people who have to be served already signed the Consent of Guardian, Nomination, and Waiver of Notice (GC-211) form, they do not need to be served.</p> <p>If you aren’t able to find the people you need to serve, please talk to Self-Help Center staff about your options.</p>



Step 5: Fill out proofs of service	The person who serves the forms must fill out the second page of the Notice of Hearing (GC-020) for people served by mail and attach the Proof of Personal Service of Notice of Hearing (GC-020(P)) for people who were served in person.
Step 6: File the Notice of Hearing	Make 1 copy of the Notice of Hearing (GC-020) and Proof of Personal Service of Notice of Hearing GC-020(P). Hand the clerk the originals and the copies. The clerk will file stamp both and give you back the copies. Keep the filed copies for your records.
Step 7: Have your fingerprints taken	Local Rules require that all proposed guardians must have their fingerprints taken as part of the background investigation process. Please refer to the instructions on the “pink” sheet in this packet.
Step 8: Prepare for the court investigation	While you are waiting for your court date, the parents, proposed guardian and the child(ren) will be contacted by a court investigator who will write a report to the court stating if and why a guardianship is in the minor’s best interest. At the court date, the court will rely heavily on what the investigator says when making its decision.
Step 9: Check the guardianship notes on the court’s website	Approximately one week before the court date, go to the court’s website: www.placer.courts.ca.gov . and check the “Tentative Rulings” link. Click on the “Guardianship Notes” link for your hearing date. Review the Guardianship Notes for your court case. If you need assistance with printing your notes or have questions about what the notes say, please make an appointment with the Self Help Center.
Next steps:	Go to your court date The Judge will sign these if orders are made at the general guardianship hearing: Order Appointing Guardian or Extending Guardianship of the Person (GC-240) Letters of Guardianship (GC-250) Optional: Bring an Order Dispensing With Notice (GC-021) if you were unable to serve some of the people you are required to.



Important Information and FAQ:

Can I Access My Court Case Electronically?

Court users can now receive access to their file/orders electronically by three different methods:

Online Portal: You can come to the courthouse and show ID to gain access;

eFiling: If you check the box on eFiling, you will receive your orders via email; you will also receive portal access if you pay for a filing (so you do not need to come into the courthouse to show ID);

eService: You may consent to receive notice and orders by email. This can be done by submitting Judicial Council Form [EFS-005-CV](#).

Where can I get the forms?

1. For an app that helps you fill out the forms for a Guardianship of the Person only, go to caguideandfile.com

- Click "Start Your Legal Process", then
- Click "Petition for Appointment of Guardian"
- Answer the questions, save, your work, and at the end you can print out the forms.
